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Hurricane Names 2010

Below you will find the listing of hurricane names for the Atlantic Ocean for the year 2010. For every year, there is a pre-approved list of tropical storm and hurricane names. These lists have been generated by the National Hurricane Center since 1953. At first, the lists consisted of only female names; however, since 1979, the lists alternate between male and female.

There are six lists that continue to rotate. The lists only change when there is a hurricane that is so devastating, the name is retired and another hurricane name replaces it. Thus, the 2010 hurricane name list is the same as the 2004 hurricane name list although four hurricane names were retired after the devastating 2004 hurricane season, so on the 2010 list Charley was replaced by Colin, Frances was replaced by Fiona, Ivan was replaced by Igor, and Jeanne was replaced by Julia.

Hurricane Preparation Guide

This is the new norm in Florida: being on constant alert for hurricanes and other severe storms, and literally paying the price - in high insurance premiums - to live here.

They may pass you by in one season, and the next they'll come right back and get you.

After two bruising hurricane seasons in 2004 and 2005, the uneventful last four years may have dulled memories. But it only takes one hurricane to create massive disaster.

The information provided in this newsletter is intended to assist residents to get prepared. We have compiled general Hurricane information, such as important phone numbers, locations of shelters for this area and a list of supplies. With a little preparation, being "Hurricane Prepared" is not a difficult thing, nor is it very time consuming. All it requires is a little planning, a little shopping and keeping up with the weather forecast, both in your local area and in the tropics.

Medical Provider Change

NOTICE TO CURRENT REGISTRANTS:

There is a change in medical provider at the Special Medical Needs Shelters. New applications are required for the 2010 Hurricane Season.

Effective June 1, 2010, medical services provided in the Special Medical Needs Shelters during a disaster or other emergency will be transitioned from the Broward County Human Services Department to the Broward

County Health Department. This results in a change in medical provider to the Health Department, and therefore requires a new application from all current registrants. All applications will be evaluated using the Florida Department of Health eligibility criteria.

If you are currently registered in the Special Medical Needs Registry, you should have received an application and letter of instruction from the Health Department. This

application must be completed with the assistance and approval of your physician.

What Should I Do When A Watch or Warning Is Issued?

A **HURRICANE WATCH** indicates the possibility that our area could experience hurricane conditions within 36 hours.

This watch should trigger your family's disaster plan, and proactive measures should be initiated especially those actions that require extra time such as boarding up, securing a boat, and securing loose debris around the outside of your home.

A **HURRICANE WARNING** indicates that sustained winds of at least 74 mph are expected within 24 hours.

Once this warning has been issued, your family should be in the process of completing proactive actions and deciding the safest location to be during the storm.

If the Hurricane Hotline has already been activated in response to a threat, it is **TOO LATE** to register for a special needs shelter. Call 954-537-2888

Debris and Trash Removal

The most important thing to remember with debris removal is to be patient! Haulers may be working in excess of 10 hours per day to meet the demand for their services. Your trash and debris may not be picked up immediately, but if it is properly bundled, it will eventually be removed.

Generally, to clear yards of debris, you should: Cut fallen tree limbs into sections of 4 feet or less; Stack material neatly at the curbside, separated from garbage; Put smaller or loose items (limbs, leaves, etc.) into tightly-lidded containers such as garbage cans or clear plastic bags and bundle piles of smaller branches with twine. Containers or bundles should not weigh more than 50 pounds.

Have A Plan In Place

You and your family should have a plan in place before disaster strikes.

Decide on places where you would meet, for example a

neighbor's home, public place or school.

Have an out-of-state relative or friend as a family contact so that all family members have a single point of

contact.

Identify two ways of contact, for example—a phone number and e-mail address.

Post emergency telephone numbers by your telephones, on the refrigerator, in your wallet or purse, and in children's backpacks.

Make sure children know how and when to call 911.

Listen carefully to authorities to know whether you should remain in your home

or evacuate to safety. Be prepared to take your disaster supply kit with you if you evacuate. Plan how you will take care of your pets.

Review and practice

your disaster plan with your family every six months.

Also, be sure you have at least one vehicle with a full tank of gas at all times.



Hurricane Preparation List

Items To Get Now Before Storm Approaches

Flashlights - Buy one for everyone in the home and make sure they are of good quality. **Battery powered radio** Am/Fm or a weather radio is good. **Rechargeable battery-operated lanterns** - Candles and kerosene lanterns are fire hazards. **Clock** - Wind-up or battery-operated. **Work Clothing** - A clean change of clothes for everyone stored in water tight plastic bags. **Working fire extinguishers** - Inspect seal and check charge gauge. Should be a class ABC! **Extra batteries** - **Toilet paper** - One roll per family member. **Matches** and **Plastic garbage bags.**

Documentation

Phone numbers - make a list (ahead) of time. **Home-owners insurance, Car insurance and Life insurance**

policies- keep a copy of your policies in a safe place and keep a set with you in a zip lock bag. **Proof of Residence** - Your drivers license should have your correct address. If not, the police may not let you back into the area.

Food and Water

Purchase enough nonperishable foods that will feed your family for at least two weeks. Store this food in a good place. Store at least a week's worth of water, 1 to 2 gallons per person per day. (This water is for cooking, drinking, brushing teeth, washing, for first aid, cleaning hands to handle contact lenses).

Fill extra ice cube trays or plastic jugs and freeze them. Be careful about what kind of container you use to store your water in. Do not use

empty milk jugs, no matter how well they are cleaned, you will never get all the milk out of the pores in the plastic! Bacteria will grow and you will get sick from it. Make sure coolers and freezers are packed with ice.

What to buy:

Medicines/Prescription Drugs -You need to keep at least a two week supply on hand. **Ice** - This is a must to keep your food cool and fresh.

Beverages - Powdered or canned, fruit juices, instant coffee, tea. **Prepared foods** -canned soups, beef, spaghetti, tuna, chicken, ham, corned beef hash, fruit cocktail, packaged pudding, canned vegetables and fruits. Dried fruits, crackers, cookies, hard candy, and nuts - Snacks for you and the kids.

Cereals - They are good without milk. **Bread** - This will stay fresh for a week.. **Dry and canned pet food** - Don't forget these guys. **Extra formula and baby food.**

Kitchen Supplies

Jugs or containers to store water -Remember NO milk jugs. **Manual can opener.** **Grill or Camp stove** - Or some other cooking device and plenty of fuel. Use canned fuel inside your home, not charcoal or gas. **Ice Chests - Coolers** - Try to have at least two...one for ice and one for refrigeration. **Paper or Plastic plates, cups, and silverware** -

A MUST...CASH - Banks and ATMs may not be open or available for extended periods.

During the Storm

Stay inside, away from windows, skylights, and glass doors.

Find the safest place in the house to ride out the storm. Generally some place in the interior of the house i.e., an interior closet.

Keep a supply of flashlights and extra batteries handy. Avoid open flames, such as candles and kerosene lamps, as a source of light.

If power is lost, turn off major appliances to reduce power "surge" when electricity is restored.
